Dear Mr. Attorney General:

On April 7, 1966, I wrote you to express concern of my colleagues and myself regarding 3. 1160, the socalled "Freedom of Information" bill and the possible interpretations of it which might result from what Professor Kenneth Culp Davis has termed "this monstrosity of draftmanship."

I have just had an opportunity to examine the recentlyissued report of the Government Operations Committee of the Bouse of Representatives on S. 1160. The fact that it contains language which clarifies the bill and substantially reliaves our carifer concerns is directly attributable to your efforts and those of Mr. Frank M. Wozencraft of your staff.

Mr. Wozencraft's graciousness in listening to our problems and his advoit use of language in attempting to resolve them are greatly appreciated. I hope that his very able analytical and drafting skills can be made available in the future to deal with 5. 1336 and like proposals which may be brought forward to amoud the other sections of the Administrative Procedure Act.
