MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT, THE WHITE HOUSE

SUBJECT: SAMOS II Launch

The inclosures which you requested comprise the information to be released for the second experimental launch of the SAMUS satellite. As you may know, such preparations to launch as well as the firings themselves are impossible to conceal from public view. Pherefore, newsmen are permitted to witness the launch.

This material represents a severe reduction from what had previously been issued. Eliminated entirely from former procedures are four pages comprising 22 questions and answers. Press briefings before and after launching have been eliminated. We have reduced the advance notice to correspondents from five to one day. New official photographs will not be volunteered as has been done heretoform in this connection, since past photographs are in the public record from SAMOS I launch (included), they will be released only upon request. It has been desired a locabile to continue to limit the media to live photography only of the launch as in the past. These modifications have been made of course with the advice of Dr. Charyk his staff and others.

A mex V comprises the general statement and the Fact Sheet to be issued at approximately the day before taunch but not to be released until launch. This embles the correspondents covering the event to gain a better perspective of the program and reduces the possibility of erroneous, distorted, or wildly speculative stortes. Experience has indicated that advance co-operation with the media has resulted in more objective coverage.
