[redacted] There are numerous computer/work stations in that department all of which use the same generic log in. The work stations at Duke are owned and managed by the University Departments, or are privately owned property of the individual graduate students working temporarily in these departments. The graduate student computers are not furnished by or purchased through Duke and there is no master work station and no oversight over any of them; each person runs his/her own work station. Further, the web pages are shared by the whole department and anyone from the department head to the cleaning lady who has "captured" the password can use any one of the computer/work stations to receive and send messages. The computer/work station involved is probably assigned to a graduate student, but the exact one can not be determined.

Further, [redacted] has determined that all of the computers in this department had their hard drives scrubbed (erased) on or about October 15, 1998.
