If you are dissatisfied with my action, an appeal may be made poussaant to 28 C.F.R. § 16.9 by writing to the Director, Offfice off histomation and Policy U.S. SDE continued to Justice, 1425 New York Avenue, Suite 11050, Washington, D.C. 20530-0001, within 60 clays from the clate of this letter. Both the letter and the envelope should be clearly marked "Freedom of histomation Act Appeal." In the event you are dissatisfied with the results of any such appeal, judicial review will the reafter be available in the district where the requester resides or has a principal phase of business, or in the United States District Court for the District of Columbia.



- \*Keep personal had thus is issess USB drives separate Do not use personal USB drives om computers sowned by your organization and rub do not plug USB drives containing proportate information into your personal computer.

#### Warning: Attackers May Attempt to Compromise Remote Access Tokens

A security breach at a vendor recently caused weaknesses in RSA SecurID tokens commonly used in remote access to Department systems. As a result, attackers may attempt to obtain users' PIN contest to access Department systems using RSA SecurID



By remaining alert for attempts to reset or obtain RSA SecurID token PIN codes, users cam assist in keeping Department information secure.

#### All Department personnel are asked to:


- Be cautious of messages, phome calls, or web pages requesting that you reset the PIN code used with your token. Contact your component IT helpoesk if you receive an unexpected request to PIN code
- Check the URL (address) of web pages asking for to ensure they are legitimate government web pa imitations that look official.
- Exercise caultion when OJJieriright contains links or attropolic.
   contains a sense of U.S. government e-mail consecutions.

Please report suspitions messages to the Justice Security Operations Center (JSOC) by email (DODCERT@usctbpj.gov)) or phome (866-USS4-GERT). Users may continue normal use of systems, keeping in mind the above requests to remain vigilant for attempts to obtain PIN codes. JSOC will distribute further information as it becomessavaidable.

# Imformation Security 101: Avoid Password Reuse

In a recent study by the Security Group at the University of Cambridge Computer Laboratory, a comparison was conducted on two websites whose password infortimation had been stoken. The websites had overtapping customers (based on email addresses) and of



Utilizing the same-cor even very similar-passwords on multiple sites means that, if one account is compromised, they all are. Unfortunablely, due to this common, insecure practice, "If a malicious headle is able to get his or her hands con a user's passwood credentals for one domain, said hacker has a good starting point for figuring out the user's password for other sites" (Samsson, infoworld.com).

This issue is particularly relevant to Department of Justice usees the earse, if an individual uses the same passworld at DOJ and non-work-related sites, they are not only jeopardizing their personal accounts, but also putting the Departments's network at risk. At the very least, users should commit to never reuse their work-related passwords for any of their personal accounts.

#### What You Should Know About Advanced Persistent Threat

You may have heard the term "Adwa Threat" or "APT" in the news, usually determined group of hackens that con computer users in an attempt to steal the long term.

Using methoditiaal attack techniques employing targeted, malicious email messsages, the attackers trick users into opening a maliciouss attachmeent or clicking a link that leads to a compromise of semsittive information. Once inside an organization, the attackers quietly move laterally among network resources, elevating privileges and stealing information, persisting potentially for years without detection.

The Justice Security Operations Center reminds users to remain vigilant for suspicious messages, keeping the following in mimad:

Attactivers may send convircing messages appearing to come from a coworker, employer, or other reputtable source to gain your trust.

- Be wary of any unsolicited message that requests you open an attachment or click a link, and attempt to confirm the authentitity of the message via phome.
- At home, employ updated antivirus software and educate others who share your computer that maliciouss e-imail messsages can compounter your computer, and remind them to view unfamiliar e-mail messages with caution.
- Submitt suspications e-imail messages for analysis to JSOC via the e-imail address DOJMAIL-STP/AMM@ussborgov

Cyber security expents predict a rise in economic and job markett-related scams in 2011; resolve to be extra vigillant in protecting yourself from cyber crime this year!

#### Lottery and Sweepstakes Scams

Assortding to the FBI's Intermet Crime Complaint Center (IC3)), consumers have reported a recent sweepstakes scann that sends emails

and letters with fraudulent checks bearing the logos of financiaal services companies. Expect to see variations of these schemes in the coming year, using text messages and phome calls.

#### **Employment Schemes**

Both "get rich quick" and "work from home" schemess have becomme increasingly common, exploiting those facing difficult fimarotial circumstances. "Common warming flags in postings for possible scams include: Inflated wages, vague wording or generic job openings, free training, guaranteed placement, no special skills or experience required, P.O. Box or out-off-state address, and job listings for government, civil service and oversees positions."



#### Social Networking Dangers

Social networkking sites are consistently risky, and threats are predicted to increase in 2011. They "provide an avenue of easy attack to users who are willing to click on every link they receive". Be sure to contact friends before clicking links, videos, etc., to ensure they are legitimaste.

# Information Security during International Travell

All federal employees embarking on intermational travel-whether work-redated or not-should keep the following tips in mind:

#### Assume You'me a Targett, Because You Probabily Are

"Traxelers need to know that in light of current worldwide political and economic instability, the fact that they are American citizens and, in particular, U.S. government employees or contractors, makes them a target for exploitation."

#### Avoid Processing and Transmitting Sensitive Information

Traveless should assume that their transmissions are being intercepted and read anywhere networks are controlled by a foreign government. "Foreign network provides can disable mobile device encryption and them turm it back on after information is intercepted".

# Power Down When Possible

Travelers should turn their mobile devices off when not in use in order to limit the potential for compromise. It is best to also remove the battery and SIM card, and store them separately from the device.

#### Steer Clear of Cafés

Intermet cafés are NOT a safe altermative to utilizing your own electronic devices. The computers at many such establishments have malicious software that can capture passwords, bank account or credit card information, and the like. Never use cafés for official businesss.

#### Be Responsiivee

In the case of a security incident, know the proper method to report tampering, unauthorized use, loss or thefit of IT media to your Components's IT Security Stafff.


### Tis the Season... to Get Scammed!

The hustle and bustle of the holidayss-- with shoppers looking for great deals in a hurry-- provides an excellent opportunity for cyber criminals to strike. Don't be footed by the common scams below:

#### Free iPad Offers

With Apple products being in high dermand this seasom, lots of phony offers for free iPads and other mendhandise are circulating online. Some users receive sparm email

messages that offer a free iPad with an online punchase. Those who attempt to make a crediit card purchase receive neither the product they supposedly paid for, nor the free iPad they

were promissed, and their account information is in the hands of cyber criminads. Others have encounteedd quizzes on Facebook and Twitter that promisse a free iPad in exchange for answering a few questions. To receive their final results, individuals must enter their cell phome number, which automatically subscribes them to a cell phome scann that changes their account \$10 a week. Malicious links and other counterfetit offers for iPads are also common on social networking sites.

#### "Helt! I'we Beem Robbed" Scam

This scam appears in the form of phomy distress messagges from someome you know, claiming they are out of town and in need of money immediately. Do not fall prey to the messagges sense of urgancy-- (irst, call or email the suppossedly stranded friend in order to verify their claims. Chancesage, they're fine and you've encounteed a scam.

### Fake Gift Cards

Cyber criminals use phishing scams with offers of free gift cards to steal users' personal information and momey. The offers can appear as pop-ups, emails, banmers on web pages, and more. "The ruse may say something like 'The first 200 people to 'Like' [imsent well-known retailer] on Facebook will receive a \$500 gift card!' Them, to claim the prize, you have to enter personal information or take a bunch of online quizzes. The personal information is used for identity thefit purposses, and the quiz results are sold to marketess, netting the crooks evem more money".

#### Charitty Scams

With increased giving, comess increased swimdling. Whem considering domatting to a charity online, remember to:

- Careffully check the name of any charity: Charity scams use names similar to the original
  charity in order to cause conflusion and obtain your donations, i.e., National Cancer
  Society (scam) instead of American Cancer Society (legitinase).
- Check the email addresss of any message from a charity. Charities sending out emails should have top level domains like .org, .com, or .net and the email should come from this domain, not a free provider like hotmail or gmail. However, as a general rule reputable charities dom't spam and you wom't receive an email from them directly without your prior inquiry.


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

# Thanksgiving Threatts

While planning partiess, printting out invitations and finding new recipess, many people forget to be particularly careful browsing the Intermet around the holidays. Be aware that cybercriminals are utilizing search results for common holiday terms to attack

unsuspecting users. Intermett searchess for "Turkeyy," "Thanksqiwimg;"
"Imvitations" and "Printable (cards))"
often yield maltidouss search results that redirect users to fake antiwirus sites. Once downbaaded, the software will do "a number of annoying things, such as






What is Fake Antiwings?

antiwiruss" and "scareware;" fake antiwiruss is a dishomesit attempt to cause a user to purchase antiwirus, registryy cleaner or some other software that repairs problems or enhances performance.

It is important to examine any link before clicking it to make sure the URL is related to the search you conducted. While this does not guarrantee the site is safe, it is a good preventative measure that can help you steer clear of maliciouss links. The best solution, however, is to type the specific URL of your intended destination in the address bar rather tham conducting broad searchess. "By mainually typping the URL in the addresss bar, you can verify the information that [your web browseri] uses to access the destination Web sitte. Too do so, type the URL in the Addresss bar, and then press ENTER".

If you encounter an antii virtus pop-upp, immediately close your browser to avoid uniintentitionally downloading the mallware, and

contact your Comparemt's IT security staff immediately.

# Fake USAA Phishing E-mails

A recent phisthing scarm has used the name of the United Statess Automobilie Association (USAA) to lure victims into handing over their credit card information. Recipients of the email are asked to click a link to fill out a "new version of USAA Confirmation Form." Once they click the link, they are redirected to a phisthing page with a fake form (see image at right) requesting their online ID, password, name, e-mail, USAA card number, expiration date, security code and PIN.

There are several warming sigms indicating this is a scam, however: a small mistake in the wording of the message, the use of shortened links (to hide the actual destination URL), as well as a browser warming that there might be a problem with the destination URL.



# "MSIL/Zeveen" Affects Insternet Explorer, Chrome, and Fireflox

A new fake anti-wires scarm in the form of a browser warning page has been spotted by the Microsoft Malverer Prietriction Center. The rogue, dubbled "MSIL/Zevern," has been spotted on various compromised websites, and is able to detect whether Interret Explorer, Chrome, or


Firefox is being used, them generate a malwarre warming page very similar to those displayed by the respective browsers (See phomy Imternet Explorer page below).

It is important to note that all "the 'upottates" point to a copy of MSIL/Zeaveen that promisess to provide 'a new approxath to windows detection, but Imternet Explorer, Fireflox, and Chrome do not offer such a solution when a website is blockeed" (Microsoft Malwaree Addittionady, y, Protection Centern). many of the pages have obvious grammær and spelling mistakess, such as "Get me our of here" (imsteadd of "out") in the Firefox warming page,



and "Phrowern antiwirus protection film onne clicik" (rattherr tham "im"). If you encounter such a warming page, hit Alt-174 on your keylboard, which will immediately kill the browser (Select "Cancel" if a dialog box appears), to avoid unintentionably downloading the mallware, and contact your Components IT security staff right away.

If a user clicks the "Update Now" or "Upgrade" box on the page, their computer will be infeated and the phomy "Win7 AV" product will be installed. It starts by conducting a fake scan, indicating that it has found malicious files, infections, and the like. While the scan



appears legitimate (see image at left)), it does not actually inspect the user's computer, and the report it generates is completely fallse; "the features don't work; everytthing is theme just to look nice, not to offer any kind of protection (just like in all other programs\$)" roguee antiwiruss (Microsoft Malwanee Protection Centern). After the initial scan, the user is informed that the program has deteesteed various problems, but cannott eradicate them unless they upgradte to the full version of the prognam (i.e. pay money)). Even if the user chooses not to purchasse the product, the MSIL/Zeven malwanee is already on their PC and

will display reminders and warming messages statting that the computer is infected. If the user does punchase the product, they will be paying for an ineffective scanner, and their credit card information will be in the hands of cyber criminals.

#### "Free iPhone" Facebook Scam

Bewarree of iPhome-related stattus updatess from friends on Facebook, with claims like: "Just testimo Facebook for iPhone out : PReceived my free iPhone today, so happy lol... If anyone else wants one go here: (limk)". Users who click on the link are asked if they want to "Alllow" the application to access their basic information. Clicking "Allow" enabless the application to access users' personnal information, as well as to post on their wall. Each click earms commission for the scammerss. Impresteed users should immediately delette references to the free iPhone from their wall, and remove the offending application from Account! / Application Settings.

# Computer "Womm" Attacks Federal Agenciess

A new computer "worm" attacked several federal agencies and Fortune 500 companies yesterdayy. The malliciouss email messages contain the subject line "Here You Have" or "Just For You" and contain a link to a seemingly legitimate PDF file. If a user clicks on the link,

they will be redirected to a malliciouss website that will prompt them to download and install a screemsaxer (.scr)) file. designed to give attackers remote access to Department systems. Due to the recenit increase and nature of these targeted intrusion attempts, we urge users to be extra cautious whem opening e-mail messages at work and at

Typically, users will receive a malicious message disguissed as a legitimate e-mail containing links or attachments, often referring to U.S. government information, reports, conferences, or meeting agematics. If a user clicks the link or opens the attackment, the attacker can gain full control of their workstation and information.

To reduce the risk of compromising your DOJ workstalting, be alert for unsolicited e-mail messagges and keep in mind the following traits common to malidious e-mail messacres:

- · Subject matter related to recipients work, possibly containing actual U.S. Government information
- · A sense of ungernow to convirtue the recipient to open an attachment or click a link within
- · Convincting content such as upcoming meeting agendas, reports, information on current events or policy issuess
- · Seemingly-legitimatete sender (government and commercial addresses, including @usdoji.ggov)) using legitimatee signaturee and contact information
- · An attachmeent (typically a .pdf or .zip file) or link

The Justice Security Operations Center would like to examine suspected malidious e-mail messages. To preserve the hidden message information typically invisible to average users, suspicious e-mail messages must be sent to JSOC in a certain way. In its presentation to the House Judiciany Subcommittee on Crimme, Terrorissm, and Homeland



Security last month, the FBI reported a significant increase in the use of social networking accounts in Intermet scames. Gordon Snow, Assistant Director of the FBI's Cyber Division, stated, "The surge in the use of social networking sites over the past two years has given cyber thiexes and child predators avenues to take advantage of unsuspecting users"

A couple common tactios used on social networking sites includte:

- Data Mining, in which cyber criminals extract bits of information about victims and them use it to seam them. A common example is a "getting to know you quiz" on a social networking site; "While the answers to these questions do not appear to be malicious on the surface, they often mimic the same questions that are asked by financial institutions or e-mail account providers whem an individual has forgotten their password" (www.retwordvorddlocom). Scammers can thus gain information that will allow them to access the victim's email, bank accounts, etc. Additionally, collecting personal information is made even easier because many users "often accept into their private sites people that they do not actually know, or sometimes fail altogether to properly set privacy settings on their profile" (www.networtkwortdcom). Friends of friends should not be able to view your birthday, cell phone number, or any other information that could be used to impensorate you to credit card companies, credit unions, etc.
- Data minimg can be applied in Phishing, in which cyber criminals attempt to acquire
  passwords, account numbers and other sensitive information by pretending to be someone
- else, often through personalized, legittimaledoloking messagess. One example is a warming message that appears to be from your bank, requesting you submit your account informalition for verification purposses (note that most banks will not contact you via email to gather information). A recent phishing scam that has plagued Facebook and other social networking sites is the "Help, I am stramded!" scam, in which victims receive a message appearing to be from a friend, claiming they have been robbed of their credit cards, passport, money, and cell phome, and are in

immediate need of money. While the simple solution to this scam is to call the supposedly stramted friend in order to verify their claims, many users fall prey to the message's sense of urgemony and send momey. Phishing scams can be found in messages, links, or videos (appearing to be from friends) within the site, or enables sent to users claiming to be from the social networking site itself.

With the growing number of social networking scams— annual crime complaints have increased 667.8% between 2001 and 2009— it is important to utilize social networking sites' privacy settings, browse cautiously and contact the message sender before clicking anything. # Zeus Botnet Incarnated to Exploit Credit Card Veriffication Services

The Zeus botmet, a Trojian horse that steads banking information, social networking logims, and email accounts, was first seem in July 2007, and has been widespread since June 2009.

Zews is particulally difficult to identify, because it is reconfigured more often than most mallware, due to its creators "...allowing other cybercriminals to license the rights to use the malware. As a result, there are many different gangs running their own licensed versions of Zews and distributing them independently" (SC Magazime)).

As your may recall, Zews resunfaced early this year as a series of emails tangesting Federal employees. The messages

appeared to be from a reputable CIA figure and warmed against a Russian phishing attack, them encouraged recipiemts to install a "Windows update" to protect their computers.

The most recent incommation of Zeus, however, poses assa credit card veriffication page. Once downloaded, the mallware waits for the user to visit a bank website, them emerges (appearing to be associated with the bank) and asks the victim to fill out an enrollment form for the Veriffed by Wisa or Mastercard SecureCode programs. The phishing page states that "Due to recent changes in FDIC Deposit Insurance Rules, all our customers must be enrolled in the Veriffed by Visa or MasterCard SecureCode program depending on type of your check card." Once the customer submits their information, the data is used to register accounts with the veriffication services and perform fraudulent transactions.

With 15 US filmarrotaal institutions affected and an estimated

1 in every 100 computers infected, this has become a

widespread problem. If you encounter an unexpected Visa or Mastercand veriffication page, it is recommended you close your browser and contact your bank regarding the issue.

# Fake AV Vendons Offening "Like Support"

Fake Antii Virus software or "Falke AV" consists of phomy alerts or warmings that typically pretend to scan a victim's computer, them claim to find some form of malkware and seek payment from the victim to remove the (non-existent) problem.



As if this scarm waxm't deceptive enough, some falke AV developers are now offering "live support" to users, in order to convirose potential victims of the legitimacy of their products. Research found that there was in fact a person – not a bott—responding to questions about the product, and "They are offering support by email, chat, and phome and are very well organized. You can get unimetables for older variants of their product, and also trial versions for their newer products" (www.securelist.com)

Remember that scammers are constantly honing their attacks to ensure they victimize increasing numbers of

computer users; phome or online "support" does not prove a particular antivirus software is legitimate. If you encounter an anti virus pop-up, immediately close your browser to avoid unintentimally downloading the malware, and contact your Components IT security staff immediately. # AT&T Security Breach Impacts iPad Users

Early in June, just two months since the release of the Apple 3G iPad, AT&IT was made aware of a breach that exposed the email addresses and associated AT&IT network authernication IDs (known as ICC-IDs) of thousands of iPad owners --many of whom are Federal




employeess. A group of security researchers called "Goatse Security" (whose motives are currently in question)) discovered the flaw and extracted 114,0000 email addresses before spreading word of the problem. Goatse Security has been accused of informing outside parties of the hole before AT&T had patched it, potentially allowing hackers to access more iPad users' email addresses. In its defense, a Goatse Security repressentative stated that "We did not contact AT&T directly, but we made sure that someone else tipped them off" before spreading word of the hole. They also stated that they were not paid for disclosing information to third partiess. AT&T dissed the hole shortly after being

notiffed, but an FBI investigation is currently underway to determine whether illegal activity was involved in the attainment of the email addresses.

According to an article from arsteathmaacoom, "...the worst consequences of this particular leak are most likely increased spann sent to or spoofed as coming from a particular e-mail

addresss. However, it's not entirely unreassonable to suspect that hackers might attempt to crack into some of the e-mail accounts revealed, which include officials from the FCC, FAA, NASA, and the Army." If you own an iPad, there is a possibility that your email addresss thas been made public through this breadh, and it is recommended that you remain particularly vigilant when checking email. If you encounter a message that may be an intrussion attempt or pose a threat to DOJ computer securityy, please follow the instructions for reporting maliciouss email at JSOC's DOJNett website:

#### DOJ SPAM Mailbox

The Justice Security Operations Center (JSOC) provides the DOJMAIL-SPRAW mailbox to allow reporting of e-mail messages that users suspect may be an intrustion attempt or a threat to computer security. JSOC analyzes messages sent to this mailbox and develops mitigation and detection methods to help protect Department systems from intrustions.

There are specific instructions that need to be followed when forwarding suspected maliciouss e-mail messages to JSOC for further analysis, which are online at JSOC's DOJNet website: <a href="http://dojnjetedcologicalizable.com/http://dojnjetedco

Please note that JECC does not analyze or block spam or other nuisance messages, unless they pose a threat to computer security.

If you would like to block spam, nuisance, or other non-mailtooss e-mail messages, several options exist:

- 1) Contact your component IT Helpdesk for information on the Proofpoint Mall Digest and end-user mail filter settings. When enabled by your Helpdesk, this service provides end-users with the ability to manage spam settings, including blocking specific e-mail addresses, OR
- 2) Contact your component IT helpotest for information on how to block specific sendens within your e-mail application using built-in tools (e.g., "Junk E-mail" filtering in Microsoft Outlook)

# Cyber Attacks Center Around 2010 World Cup

The FIFA World Cup 2010, like most events that receive heavy media coverage, has provided cyber criminals the opportunity to attack unsuspecting computer users in various ways. Using hacking techniques, attackers have managed to have their malicious sites listed in the top Google search results Asseemin the Image below, the top four results -- out of over 17,000- for a World Cup-related query led to malicious websites. Clicking on any of the top results causes a phony "Windows Security Center" notification to pop-up, a common Fake AntiWioss techniques. Users need to be cautious whem conducting popular searches, and

immediately close their browsers if they receive a supposed "antivious alert." (For more information on Fake AV attacks, see the February 2010 issue of News You Can Use.)

Cyber criminals are also sending out emails with malicious PDFs, claiming the attachmeents contain free World Cup tickets or a World Cup Travel Guide. Users stroudd use their better judgmeent when faced with offens that are unsolicited and/or sound too good to be true, and refrain from opening such attachmeents.

### DOJ Continuous Monitoring Imittative

DOJ is in the process of moving to a model of continuous monitoring of assets, vulmerabilities, configuration changes, and threats in order to fulfill operating requirements, minimize risk exposure, and improve computer incident response. The Department's current risk management model focuses largely on "snapshots" provided by periodic assessments and audits. This model is not only reactive, but the operating environment is also ever-otheraging, resulting in security assessments that are quickly outdated and lack a real-time evaluation of risk.

Due to this deficiency, DOJ made the decision to implement Enterprise Lifecycle Management System (ELMS) BigFix. This technology will provide situational awareness and greatly improve our current risk management methods. Continuous monitoring will provide real-time asset inventories and endpoint visibility to the Department through a centralized management console. DOJ Components, OBDs, and system

owners will also have their own console to monitor and evaluate system vulmerabilities to determine applicability within their environment. Having an accurate understanding of DOJ's security posture will emable us to assume greater risk levels whem appropriate. Additionally, new FISMA reporting guidelines were released last week, which require changing to automated data feeds, and ELMS supports these new requirements.

Continuous monitoring technology will allow decision makers access to key information quickly and efficiently, and streamline Department compliance reporting. DOJ will now be able to fulfill data calls within hours --rather tham weeks or months-- while eliminating the uncertainties of self-reporting.

## User Awanteness Tip

#### Post-Tax Day Email Scams

Aprill 15th has passeed, and many taxpayers are anxiously awaitting their returns. Not surprisingly, hackens are seizing the opportunity to scam as many users as possible by sending out fraudulent emails marked as notifications from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Many of these emails claim that taxpayers must submit

financial information such as bank account and credit card numbers, passwords and ATM PINs in order to receive their returns. Some are intended to frighten taxpayers by claiming to come from the IRS' "Fraud Department:" Others state that taxpayers will receive money for filling out a custommer satisfaction survey. It is important to note that the IRS does not initiate taxpayer communications through e-mail.

# Operation Aurora

Mid-December 2009, hackers initiated a hightly sophisticateted attack on Google and more than twenty other companies, with the goal of accessing source code and gathering information about dozens of U.S., Chinese and European users who were advocates of human rights in China. A combination of encryption, stealth programming, and exploitation of a previously unknown ("zero-ctay")") vulnerability in Microsoft Internet Explorer allowed hackers entry into two Gmail accounts, but Google ctains the access was limited to account information rather than actual email content. Upon investigating further, however, Google discovered that hackers had successfully gained entry into targeted Gmail accounts via phishing scams and malware on the users' computers. The attack was tentatively linked to China due to the presence of an obscure algorithm in the malware, which had only been published in Chinese and was virtually unknown outside of China.

Referencess im the mallware to a file folder named "Aurora;" earned the attack the name "Operation Aurora;" The incident has resulted in considerable contention between Google and Chima, with Google refusing to continue censoring certain search results on its Chimesesseach engine, stating



"...these attacks and the surveillancee they uncovered-combibired with attempts over the last year to further limit free special on the web in China including the persistent blocking of websites such as

Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, Google Docs and Blogger-hadd led us to conclude that we could no longer continue censoring our results on Google.cm" (The Official Google Blog). On March 22nd, Google announced on its blog that users visiting Google.cn are now being redirected to Google.comhkk, where they will receive uncersored search results, and which will "mreamingfully increase access to information for people in China." China maintains that its Internet safety policy is transparent and consistent, and resents the U.S.'s accusation that it had any participation in the attack.

Operation Aurona servess as a cogenit remiimoter to the general public to remain diligent on patching. Microsoft issued an out-offbaadd (outside the normal schedule) patch for Aurona on January 21, 2010, but as word of the Intermet Explorer vullmerability spread, hackers scrambled to exploit it before users were protected. It is therefore crucial to apply patchess as soon as possible; JSOC releases/PPRs for software patches resolving vullmerabilities with a CVSS base score of 7.0 or above (as determined by the National Institute of Standards and Technology),, and sets patch implementation precedence tassed on public exploitation of vullmerabilities, if applicable.



Until recently, Fake AWs were primarily located on Trojen Horse applications; however, due to the success of this particular attack, hackers have now migrated falkeralleriss to browseers.



As discussed in a Webroot.com blog, am image searcth for a tellewission actresss yiellabed phomy image links leading to a suppressed Microsofft Intermet Explorer "warmingg" whileth stateed that the user's system had been compromised (the typical Fake AW baitting taction). Strangety, the Google ssearch pane remains at the top of the page, while the fakealent rums in the lower section (see image at left)).

Once the user clicks the fakealert, a rogue antiwiruss (wiitth a name such as "Tottall Securitty" or "Securitty Tool") hides the

desktoop with its personalized wallpapeer, intenferes with the user's ability to rightclick their mouse or use its scroll wheel, prohibits applications from rumning (including Intermet Explorer), and blamess all of the problemss on an infection within the machine. The purposse of this elaborate Fake AW or "scareware attack" is to convinceusers to spend \$50 to \$90 on boques antiwires softwere, contributing to the millions of dollars in profits generated by this scam to date.

If you encounter a falkealent, hit Alt-174, which will immediately kill the browser (Select:"Carroce!" if a dialog box appears), to avoid unintentingally downloading the malware, and contact your Components IT security staff right away.

Public reports indicate that the messages contain subjects including "Governmental registration program on the H1N1 vaccimation" and "Your personal vaccination proffle:" Subject lines related to this malware campaign will likely change over time.



Five steps for securing and locking down virtual environments and meeting compliance requirements:

- Platiform/leade ining Configure the virtualization platform, both the hyperwisor and administrative layer, with secure settings, eliminate unused components, and keep up-to-date on patches
- 2. Configuration and Change Management Extend your current change and configuration management processes and tools to the virtual environment
- 3. Administrative Access Control Server administrators should have control over virtual servers and network administrators, over virtual networks, and these administrators need to be trained in virtualization software in order to avoid misconfiguration of systems
- 4. Network/Securityyand Segmentballion Deploy virtual switchessand virtual firewalls to segment virtual networks, and use your physical network controls in the virtual networks as well as change management systems. Be sure that machines handling protected data are isolated, and deploy virtual IDS//PSess
- 5. AuditLogging Monitor virtual infrastructure logs and correlate those logs across the physical infrastructure, as well, to get a full picture of vulmerabilities and risks. Adapt automated tools and SIEM systems to integrate logs from both environments.

Lentz said the government continues its research into attack surfaces to produce an agille, dynamic defense capable of not only detecting but being able to take a proactive role to prevent future attacks against government infrastructure before they happen." It's all threaded in this area of driving anonymity out of network;" Lentz szaidd.

The popullar social networking site Twitter came under attack Thursday August 6, 2009 and was out of service for the better half of the day. Service was eventually restoneed by late that evening. The site was completely inaccessible for all of its users and analysists believe the denial-of-senvice attack may have originated in Russia or Georgia.

Sociall netwww.rkingg site Facebook and searcth engine giant Google femotied off simillar attactives on Thursottay as well.

At about 10:30 a.m. E.S.T., millions of people worldwide received e-mail messagges containing links to Twitter and other sites. Withen recipients clicked on the links, those sites were overwhethedd with requests to access their servers causimon masssive network traffic that created the denial of service.

#### SpammærsExploiting Free File Storageon Websites

Automated account creation exploit lets spammers hide behind legitimate file storagge services. An unusual attack technique has enabled spammers to distribute more tham 1 million messages an hour using legitimate, free file storagge services available on the Interret.

In a blog published earlier this week, AppRiver, a security services provider, describees the unusual approximath. In a nutsihell, spammers have created an automated method for creating accounts in popular free file storage services -including groups.yahoo.com, groups.google.com, and livejournal.com - and are using those accounts to host their sparm content. The use of these sites makes the sparm appear to be legitimable, thus enabling it to bypass commonly used blacklists.

AppRiverr has tweetest its own defenses to detect the new spam attack and block it, but traditionabl sparm tolls that blacklist IP addressess or domains will not block the new attactions.



## Cyber Criminals Roll Out: Fake Microsoft Patch Malware Campaigns

Be on the look out for the following malware campaigns designed to emulate legitimate Microsoft (MS)) updatess. If you encounter any of these updatess at work, record the URL and notify your IT Security staff as soom as possible. Home userssibolal only accept MS program updates through Microsoft's website at www.microsoft.coom.

- Important Windows XP/Vista Security Updates: This fake update is often sent via email with a fake Conflicter removal tool that can often be identified by Conflicter being misspelled as "Conflicter".
- Outslook Re-Configuration Campaign: A fake Outlook Update executable
  file (outlook update.exe) is being posted to legitimate websites that have
  been compromised. Outlook updates should only be performed through the
  MS website.
- Critical Outfloodk Update: This thind malware attack should be familiar to
  most users as it's delivered via am email attachment (officexpKB90022-1Full FFideENULexe). Do not doubtle click attachments, especially exe ffless,
  offering any type of software update.

#### Adobe Implements Quanterly Security Patching, Updates

Adobbe released their first quarterly patch that addressess 13 critical PDF vulmerabilities to Reader and Acrobat 9, and earlier versions of this software. Adobe recommends users upgrade to the newly released 9112 version as soon as possible. If you are running an older version of Acrobat or Reader, and can't upgrade, visit JSOC's Website for alternate version upgrades.

The Department's IT security stafff performs software updates to your work computer, but check to make sure your home computer is set to perform automatic updates. If not, change this preference, or perform a manual update. Software that cannot be set to automatically perform updates should be updated manually on a monthly schedule.

The first week of June introduced Twitter users to their first antiwiruss for-prooffit scamm promissing a "besit video" via a fake YouTube website.

This is the same antiwirus scam that has been circulating on other social networking sites and through email. The scam directs the user to a malicious site that installs the virus.



Fake search enginess and misspelled website domain traffic are big business, especially in the financial and social networking market, because visitors think they are on a real website and share their information without suspicion. Users are at serious risk of encountering one of these phomy websites if they spend time surfing and sharing information over the Internet.

The Department will begin implementing BlueCoaRM filters in accordance with DOJ order <u>2740.11A</u> to help protect its networks against existing threats and non-work related Internet usage. Non-work related Internet usage continues to be one of the largest threats to the Department's information security. Remember, network security is everyoness responsibility.

#### New Information Phishing Schemes

Fake information gathering schemess based on popular topics, themess, and games are being created by identity thiexess to entime users into entering personal information. These typess of groups or discussions often require the user to input their first pet's name, mothers maiden name, street address, first school, etc. to join/register before the user can participate.

Disclosing of this kind of personal identifying information is very useful to identity this exess as it's the same type of information required by web email accounts, legitimate websites, and banking institutions. Be careful with any personal information as it is very difficult and expensive to rebuild a "digital identity" once it has been compromised.

If you encounter this kind of request for personal information at work, do not fill in the information; note the URL, and report it to your IT security staff as soon as possible. Information solicitations received at home can be ignored by closing the browser window or navigating to a new website.

#### Computer User Tips

#### Updateand Patch Your System Software Often

As soon as a security patch is announced, malicious coders are hard at work writing code into their websitess and email attacks to exploit information from your computer, before they can be patched. Coders have reduced the time it takes them to write code to exploit a new vulmerability from weeks or days to hours! Microsoft automatic updates are performed every Tuesday in what is referred to as "Patch Tuesday". The Department's IT security staff performs these updates to your work computer, but check to make your home computer is set to perform automatic Microsoft updates. If not, change this preference, or perform a manual update. Software that cannot be set to automatically perform updates should be updated manually on a monthly schedule.

Social networking sites are delivering malware 10 timess more effectively than email.

Kaspenskeyy Llabbs's Malware Evolution 2008 report indicates that 10% of all malware delivered via social networking sites are successfully installed onto members' computers.

Kaspenkeyy Lab collectbed over 43,0000 mallware samples from social networking sites in 2008, while McAfee reported 800 new variants of the Koobifacce virtus.

The new version of Conflicter, identified on April 9, 2009, attempts to install new mallicious code, scareware, and Walterfac 1 Downadup onto infected computers. This new version is especially dangerous as these software additions are designed to scare and trick users into navigating to mallicious websites that capture personal and financial information.

If you bedieve your home computer may be infected with Conflicker, there's an easy way to find out. Conflicker blocks access to websites that contain software that may interfere, block, or remove its installation. Open your interret browser at home and try to visit the following websites: <a href="www.mozafee.com">www.mozafee.com</a> or <a href="www.mozafee.com">www.symantee.com</a>. If you are unable to reach these websitess, your computer may be infected. Please <a href="click here">click here</a> to read USCERT's information on how to detect / remove Conflicker from your home computer.

#### Malicious Email (Spam)

Sparm accounts for over 97% of all email, and is still a maim delivery vehicle for mallicious coolers who propagate their malware, bothets, and viruses over the intermet. While there have been successful shutdowns of sparm sending companies (MCObb's solous ere in Nov. 2008 resulted in a 60-770% reduction in mallicious mail and bothet delivery in the US during Nov. and Dec. 2008), there are others that have stepped in and already increased sparm delivery rates above preeMCObb'delevels.

### · Fake Conficker Imfection Alents

Scarewaree email campaigns are circulating that try to scare the recipient into accepting fake antivirus software by saying the recipient's computer is infected with Conficker. If infected, the computer will attempt to download the Waledarc botnet and spread the virus to other computers.

# · Stimulus Package Offers

Malicious email is circulating with the IRS logo and picturess of President Obarma that adventise available stimulus package money for cash strapped individuals. These emails request personal, credit card, and other financial information to verify that the recipient is qualified for stimulus funds.

#### · Tax Return Solicitation

Fake tax return emails are being sent that offer "cash now" in exchange for the recipients's tax return, or changes for services to expedite a tax return. These emails are designed to collect your Social Security number, date of birth, mother's maiden name, credit card information and the PIN for your ATM card. Tip: The IRS never initiates contact with taxpayers via email if it has to do with your account or private information.

Be very suspiciouss of any emails you receive from strangers, companies, or government agencies that request personal, financial, or credit card information. If you receive an email that directs you to a website requesting you to download or update a program, do not accept the offer and close the web browser window. Clock here for instructions on how to report any malitious / spam email you have received at work to your IT security staff or JSOC.

### Social Networking Mebsites and Job Boards



There continues to be a surge in malware, viruses, and botnets directed toward and residing on social networking and job board websites. Malicious coders have turned their attention to these websites (See USAJobs Advisory) because of the wealth of information available, and the relative ease at which members seem willing to share it.

If you, are a member of a social networking or job board website, change your password today, and change it often. Use a password that is at least '8 characters long with a combination of upper and lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.

## Malicious Web Sites EncrypttLocal Files

A rush of new fake antiwires websites are being designed to emulate authentic sites due to the success they have had at tricking visitors into downloading their malicious content. Some of these websites contain "scareware" programs that attempt to scare the visitor into installing their malware or virus. These websites are normally identified by warming messages or pop-ups that tell the visitor a software upgrade is needed or something bad is happening to the visitors computer, and offens their software as the solution. Unfortunately this action results in installing the malware or virus the visitor was trying to avoid.

A few scarewere sites have introduced a new feature into their malware encryption. This new version attempts to encrypt and scramble files inside the visitor's "my documents" folder when installed. Once the encryption process is complete, the visitor must purchase an encryption key from the malitioussitie to access their files.

### Computer User Tips

#### **Website Passwords**

Two-tthirds of computer users use one or two passwords to access all their websitess. If you are one of these users, do not allow your web browser to autormatically save your passwords. This practice allows anyone with physical or remote access to your computer, access to your web site accounts. If your browser supports an encrypted master password, your saved passwords may be more secure, but there are programs designed to break this encryption.

#### Secure Your Wirekess Routerrat Home

When installing a wireless network at home please take the proper steps to ensure it is secure. Look in the manual for how to change the wireless ID (also known as the SSID)) to something unique. Turn on the Wi-Fi Protect Access (WPA or WPA2) for authentication, enable Temporal Key Integrity Protect (TKIP) for encryption, and use Media Access Control (MAC) address filtering. An unsecured wireless network allows other computer users to use your bandwidth for free, and possibly use it for illegal activities. If the police come looking, a person with a unsecured network would have a difficult time proving the activity didn't come from one of their computers.

#### Fake Walledtac Coupon Welbsitess

Coupomizer.com, a legittimable site used to optimize and gather coupoms, is the latest target of the Waledac virtus. Fake Coupomizer websites are now online that utilize IP geollocation databases to locate website visitors. This solution is new for Waledac websites, and allows coders to further trick the visitor by offering national and local coupoms based on the visitoris location.

The Waledacc virus, which infects computer systems to collect email addressass, is delivered as san email or Ecard that directs the recipient to a fake website that installs the virus whem clicked by the visitor.

# Cyber Crime in 2009

Data capture, passwords, and account numbers will continue to be the target of maliciouss codens in 2009. While the Department of Justice is utilizing all resources to protect its users against these risks, home users are expected to encounter a dramatic increase in fake email and malicious websites. Inclustry also predicts mobile cell phone networks are the next target due to the advances, popularity, and the variety of ways smart phonesare being used.

- Data Captures Malicious coolersaere constantly modifying the schemes they use to gather information from unsuspecting users. Be careful when opening email attachments, accepting free offers, and surfing the internet. There is someone out there trying to collect your information.
- Smartt Phones: Voice and touchtone phishing (much like email and web phishing), malwane, and cellular botmets are predicted to become a serious threat to the mobile network in 2009. Malicious coute is being written to take advantage of the growing trend in mobile interactivity with companies that require social security numbers, account numbers, and passwords to verify identity. High value targets will also include individuals that interact with financial institutions to transfer funds and stocks through mobile devices.

#### Social NetworkinggRisks

Social networkking is often used to find old friends, create new friends, and network with people of common interest. This free exchange of information establishes addies as ease of security as the user thinks only "friends" are viewing their posted information. Malicious codes sexploit this vulnerability by inviting contacts within the network to click on their page. Once clicked, the embeddied code infects the visiting user's computer and directs it to collect personal information from the user, the user's friends, and user's groups on the network.

#### Fake Antivirus Softwaree Updates Wreak Havoc across the Internet t

Malicious software disguissed as a legitimate Antivirus Update is tricking users into downloading and installing its Trojam virus. Recently, there has been a signifficant increase in Fake Antivirus (AV) Trojam Horse software that is utilizing social engineering primaiples to fool unsuspecting users into compromising their own machines. Do not upgrade your antivirus software through hyperthinks offered by unknown website or pop up wimdows. These software updates are automatically provided by the DOJ IT service providers at work. If you believe your antivirus software at home needs an update, open the program from your desktop and select the buttom or link provided to perform a manual or live update. (ISOCC White Paper)

# A Trick for Remembering Long Passwords

When creating a password, users should avoid common words, proper names, and randomly generated passwords such as "GrTkCOPRICSS!", which would be impossible to remember. Try using a phrase that is familiar and easy to remember (example: "IBowled%2855!"). This password meets the Department's 12 character password requiremeents by using uppercase eadd lowercase letters, numbers, and symbols.

# Security Awareness Tips

### MalwareTargets USB and RemovableMedia

In recent months, JSOC has identified a significant rise in the number of dangerous malware downloads targeting removed media devices. This rise has been attributed to malidious coders writing malware focused on infecting USB and removes media storage devices to spread the virus quickly.

Thumb drivess, external hard drivess, CD/DWD-RXWV, and flash media (digital camera/phoness) are targeted because they are portable, and easily exchange information between computers. When infected devices are connected to a computer they attempt to install Trojan software that rums in the backgroundd unnoticed by the user.

Steps you can take to help protect your home pc:

- Disable Auto-Run. It's important to disable Auto-Run as this feature allows
  removable media to automatically start or install any software programmed
  to run when the device is inserted into a computer. This allows the Trojan
  to spread throughout your computer and commented devices. Please see the
  help instructions on your home computer to disable Auto-Run.
- Imestall Firewall and Antiwiruss Software. Windows XP and VISTIA come with a firewall that protects against most intrusions, please make sure it's enabled and updated on a weekly basis. Norton and MacAfee, along with many others, also offer "off the shelf" choices for both firewall and antiwiruss protection solutions.
- Create a User Levell Logim (withhouttadmimistrative privileges), and use it
  as your maim logim account. This helps reduce your risk of infection, and
  denies full admimistrative access to your computer in the event your logim
  credenttats are compromised. An Administrative Login should never be
  used when connecting to the intermet.

## Computer User Tips

#### Avoid Malicious Code and Software

Current web technology makes it possible to embed additional code inside a primary webpage. Hackers are able to misuse this technology to carry out mallicious activities, such as redirecting the user's web browser to websites that secretly download intrusive software. A number of popular websites have been impacted by these attacks because the code is sophisticated and hidden from plaim view.

Steps your can talke to help protect your home pc:

- Upgradule to Microscofts's Implement Explorer 7.0 (IE 7). IE7 includes many user friendly enhancements and new security features that help protect against mallware intrustions.
- Regularity Update Computerss and Applications. Ensure Microsofft Update is scheduled to check weekly for product updates. Applications that do not automatically perform weekly updates should be updated manually.
- Immprove Your Password Security. Increase your password length to a minimum of 12 characters that include upper and lower case letters, and at least one number and special character. A longer password providess significantlyly higher protection from unauthorized access.

This virtus spreads with a note from a friend that might say, "You're really funny in this video." If clicked, the link connects to a website which asks your downtbadd an update to your Adobe Systems Flash player. This link will attempt to install the Koobfaceon your computer.

Koobiface modiffes user profiles to redirect their visitors to mallicious websites.
