

Friday, 27 July 1945, continued

- 1:20 pm Mrs. O'Leary called Gen Groves from Boston re delivering papers to Dr. Conant. Lt. Noland was to pick them up at about three and take the 5:00 p.m. plane out.
- 2:45 pm Lt Davies, New York, called Mrs. Widmayer requesting the signed letter from Rosa Mae McMahon so that it could be used in the case that was pending. (Mrs. Widmayer sent the original by special messenger and kept a copy in the file).
- 4:15 pm Gen Groves called Col Warren re Friedell making measurements on certain family out there. Gen Groves suggested that Col Warren call Davies in New York and get the matter straightened out because there seems to be a difference in stories between Daley, Hemplemann and Davies. Gen Groves also asked Col Warren to tell Davies that he was released as far as the General was concerned.
- 4:15 pm Lt Davies from MSA, N.Y. called Gen Groves and advised Gen Groves that Lt Daley called him and informed him that Friedell's boys had made some further observation and are concerned about one family to the extent that they want to get in touch with that family to see how they feel. They called me to ask me about the legal end--told them there was nothing I could do about it. Told them to confer with Col Warren and you. I am sure nothing has been done yet. The call came in a few minutes ago and thought I would relay the message to you. Davies advised the General that he would be at Maj Taney's office at MSA and will stay there until Gen Groves calls releasing him.
- 5:35 pm J R Oppenheimer called Gen Groves re: matters of immediate concern. Oppie said he wanted to talk about three cables. Wanted to talk about former column. Gen Groves asked if that was second column and Oppies said "yes". Won't be able to finish this until two days later than requested Oppie told Gen Groves because of complicated transportation. Oppie said they were pressing things as hard as they could. Gen Groves said he thought that would be alright as things looked better. Gen Groves said he thought deSilva's crowd could help. Oppie said he didn't want to do anything else without a definite answer and Gen Groves agreed. Oppie said Ernest was there and had discussed with Shein about Coolidge organization and he thought
